



# THE INVERLEIGH COMMUNITY PLAN SURVEY 2021 RESULTS



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## INTRODUCTION

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The Inverleigh Community Plan Survey was developed by the Inverleigh Progress Association (IPA) with the purpose of surveying the Inverleigh Community on local matters. The survey will form the basis of the Inverleigh Community Plan that is to be developed.

The survey was conducted over the month of November in 2021 and was published on the IPA website ([www.inverleigh.org.au](http://www.inverleigh.org.au)). It was advertised widely in the Leigh News publication, the Leigh News Facebook page, emailed to subscribers of the Leigh News, posters were displayed in Inverleigh and flyers were widely distributed.

The survey itself consists of 61 questions and addresses areas relating to:

- demographics
- liveability
- community safety
- the environment and landscape
- facilities and infrastructure
- sports and recreation
- Inverleigh businesses
- social and inclusion

The survey resulted in 221 people responding to the survey. The data for each question has been collated in this document and is represented in a way that best fits the question. A range of graphics are used to present the data along with the collation of written responses for the open questions.

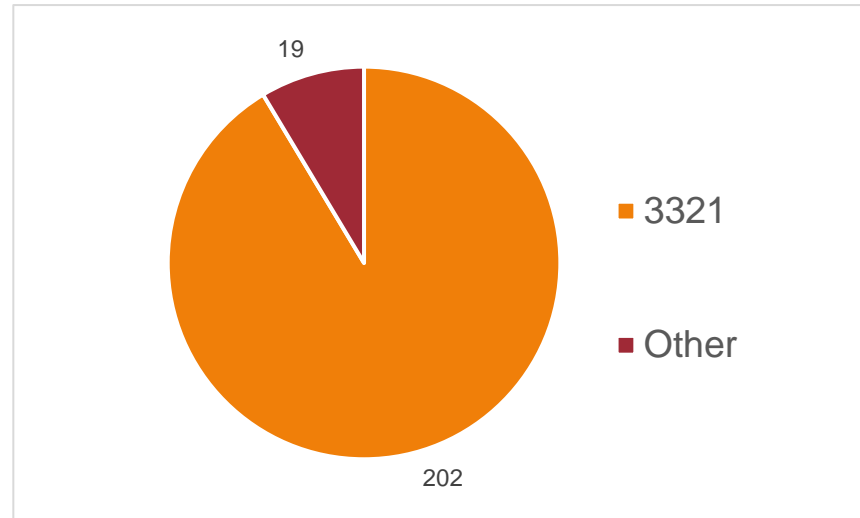

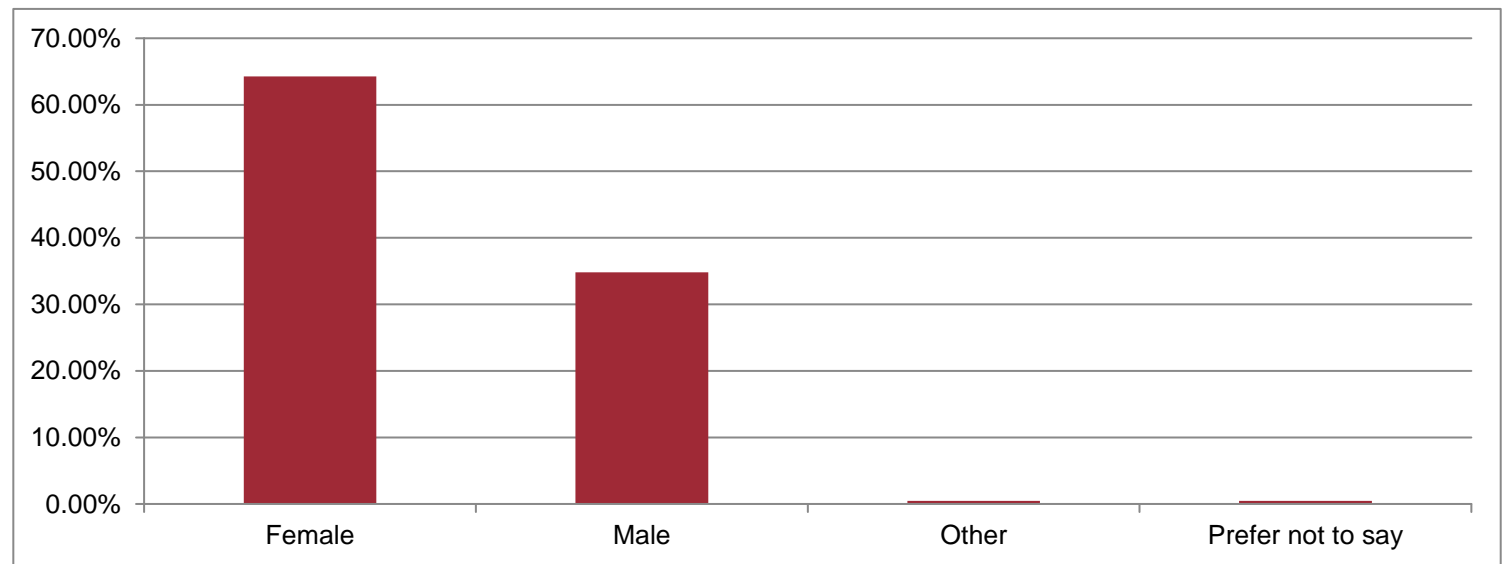
Q1. What is your postcode?

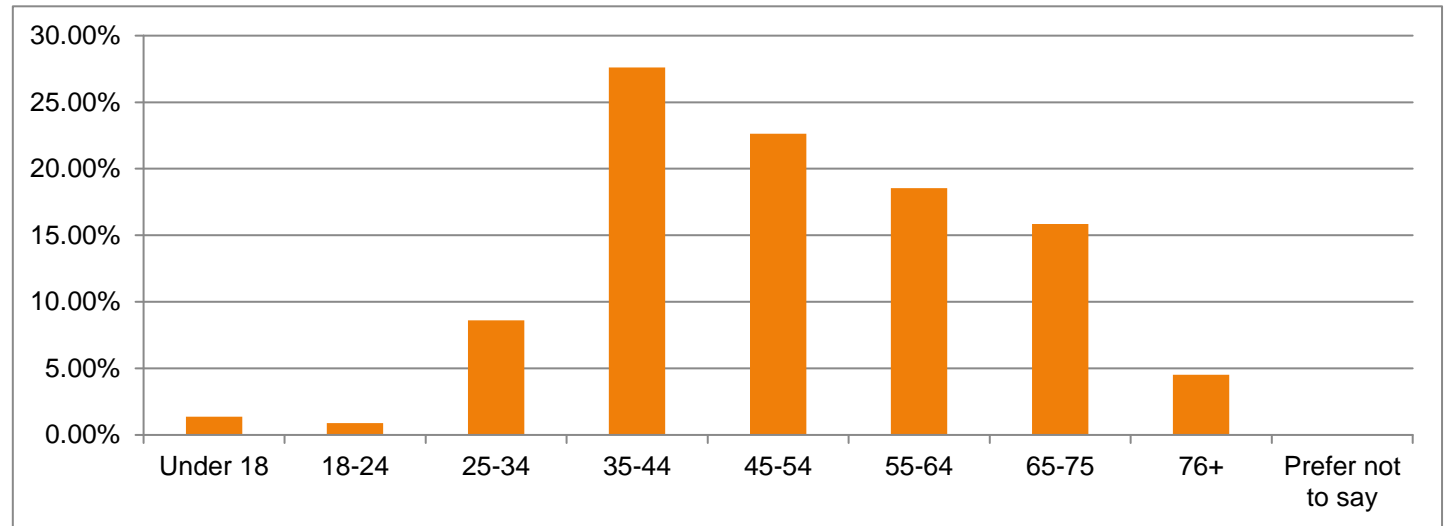
Q2. What is your gender?

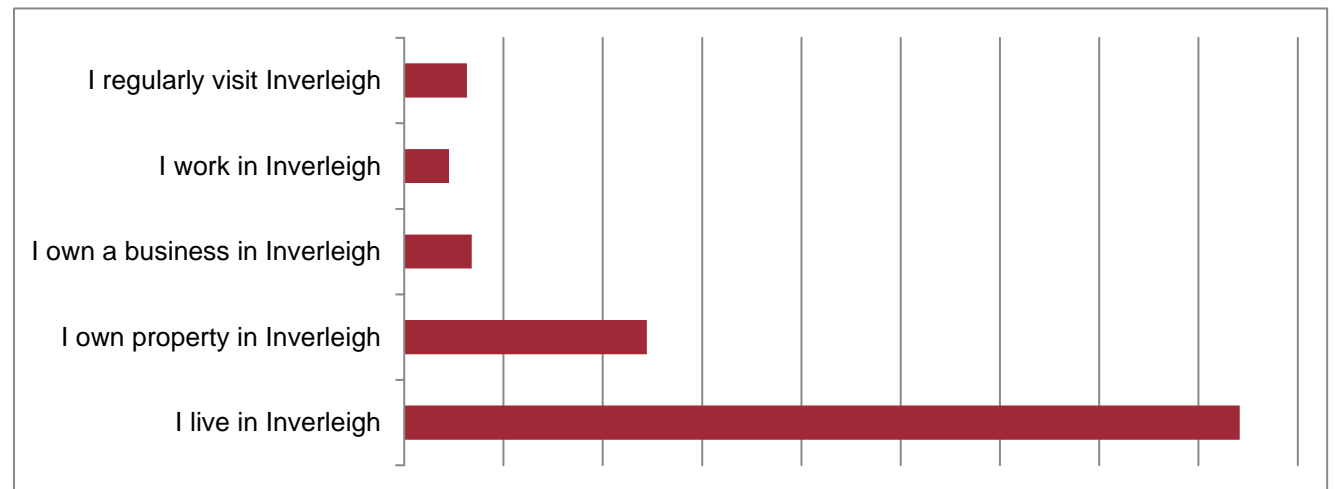

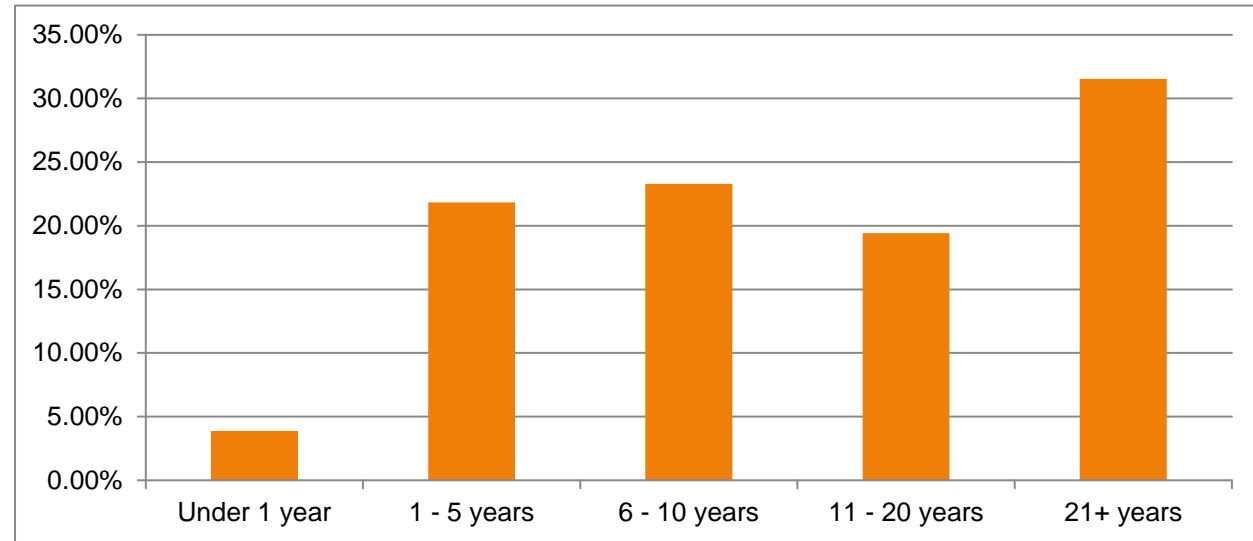

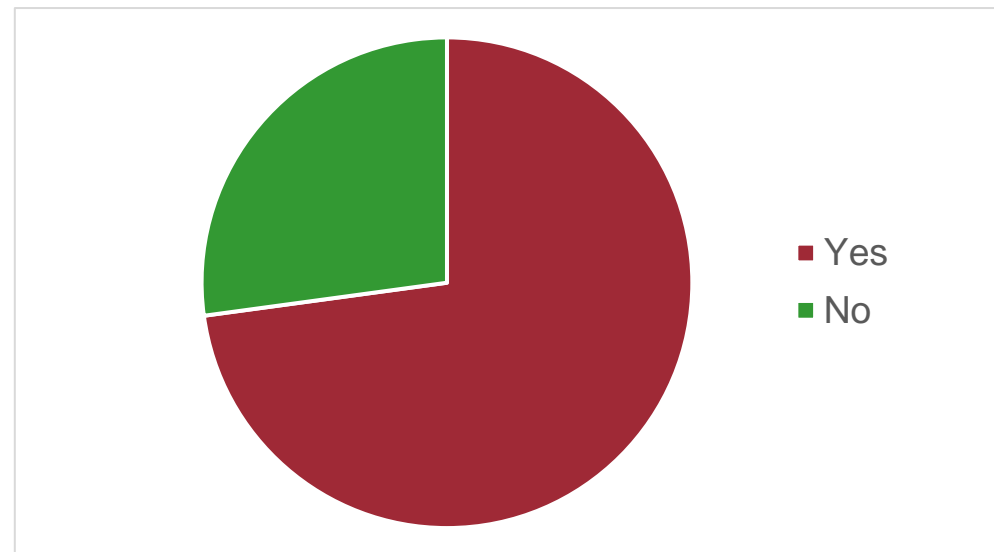
Q5. If you live in Inverleigh, how long for?

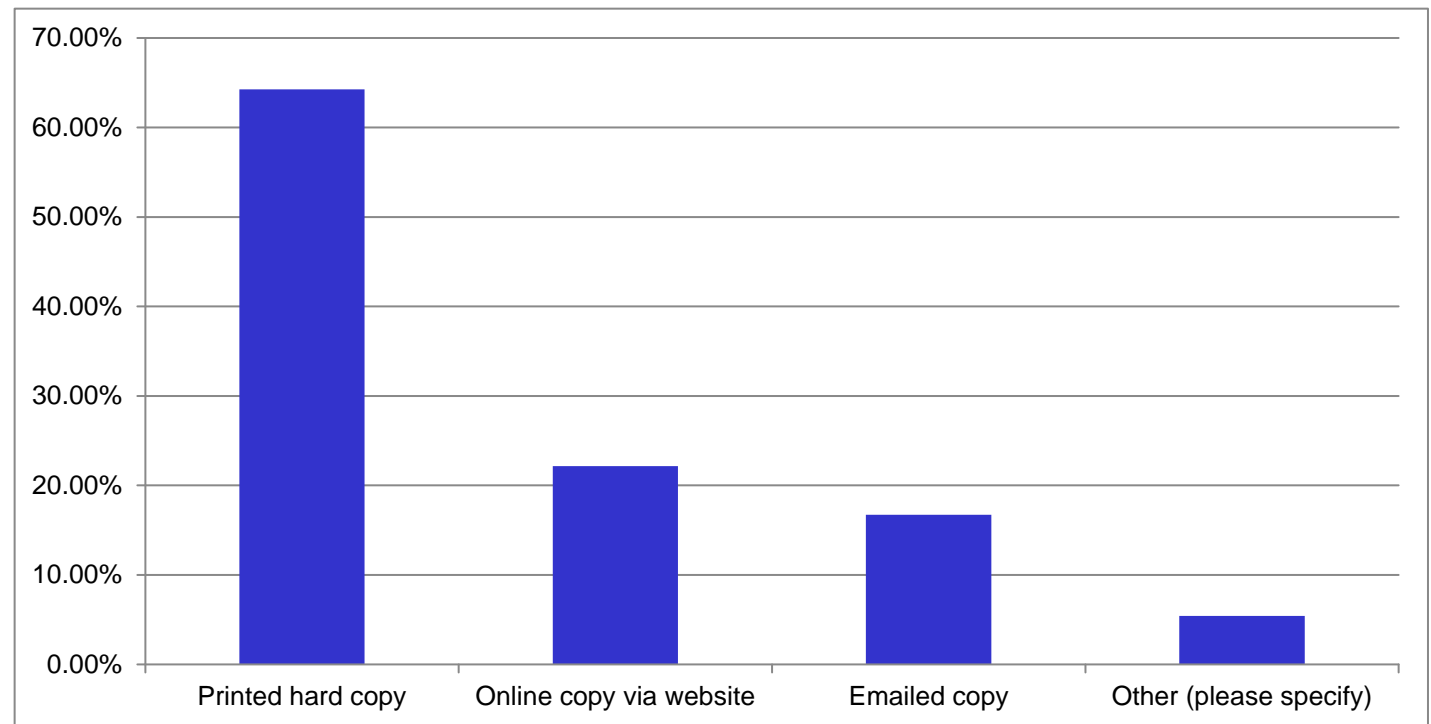
Q6. Do you receive your monthly hard copy of the Leigh News community publication?

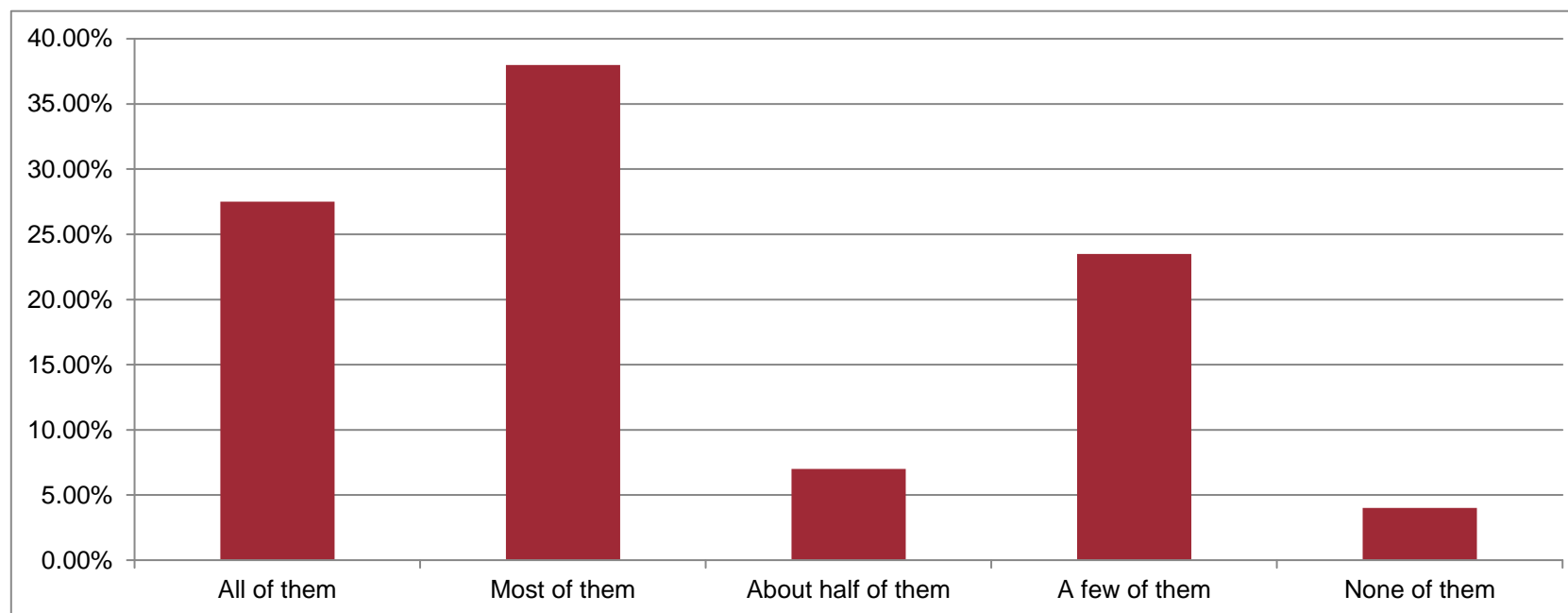

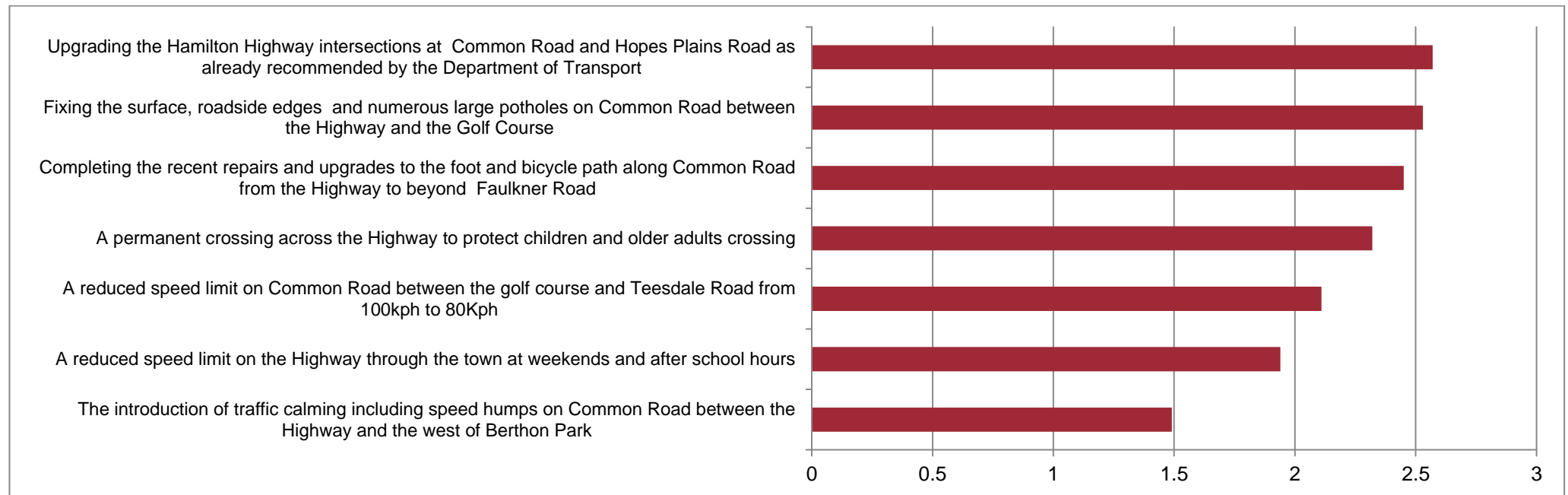

Q29. Which of these community improvements are most important to you?

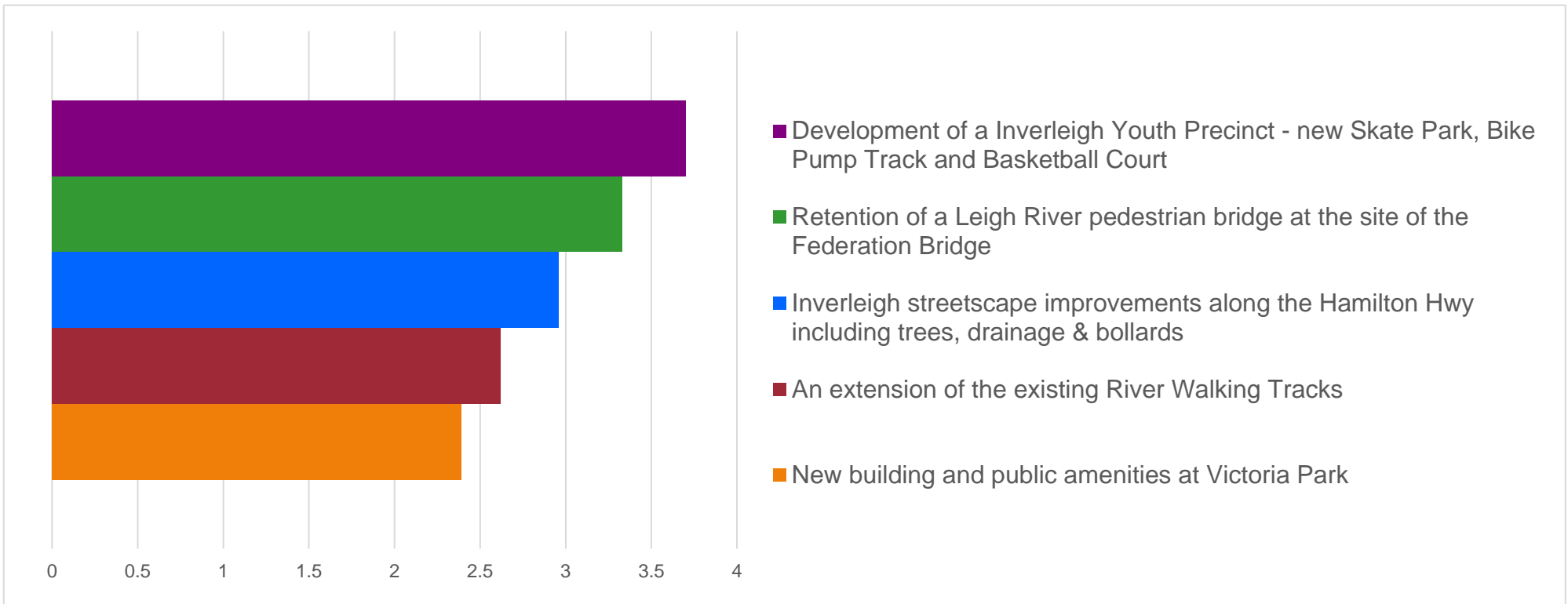


Q30. What priority would you give the following small Inverleigh community projects?

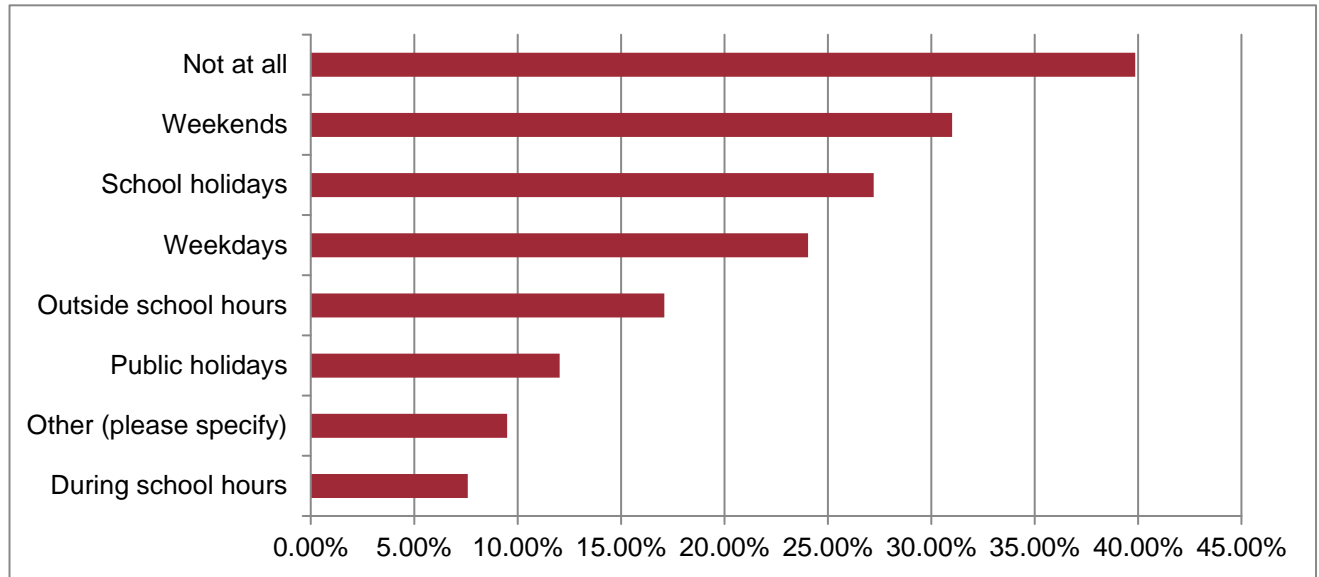
Q35. Which town/s should Public Transport from Inverleigh be connected to?

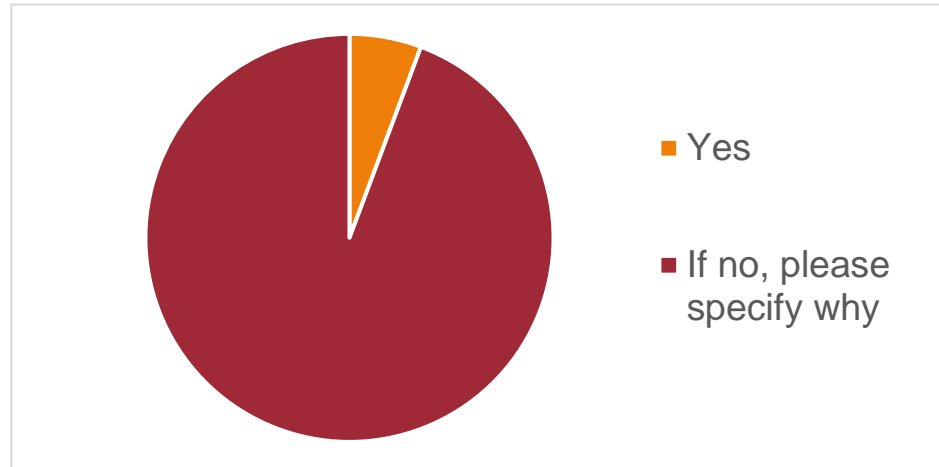

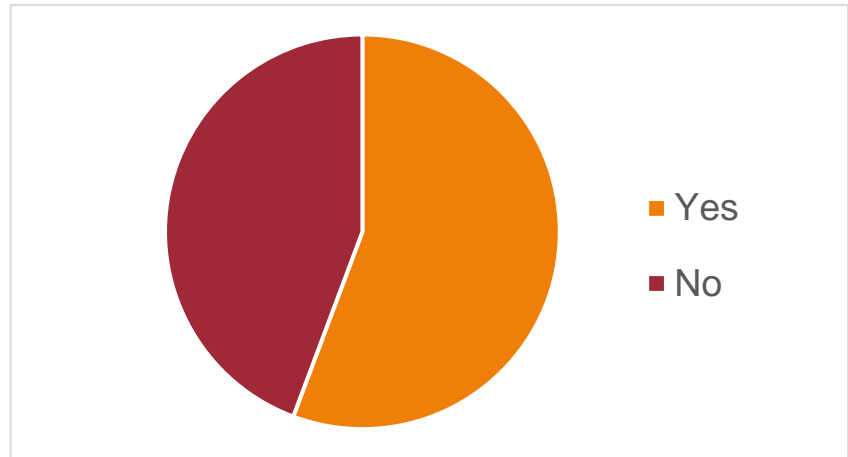

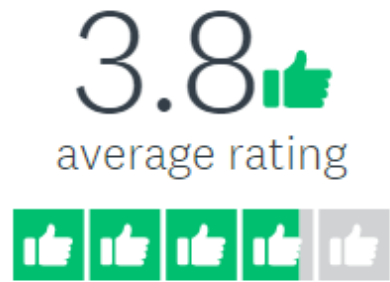

Q40. How satisfied are you with the public parks in Inverleigh?

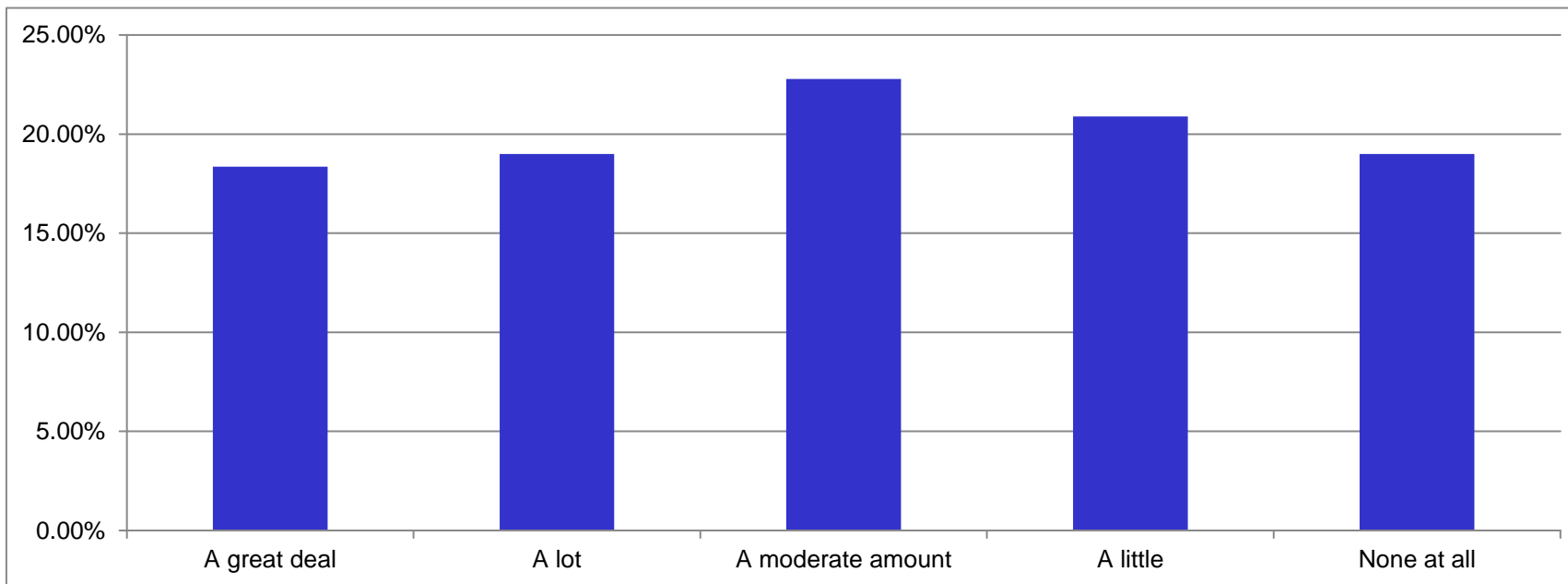

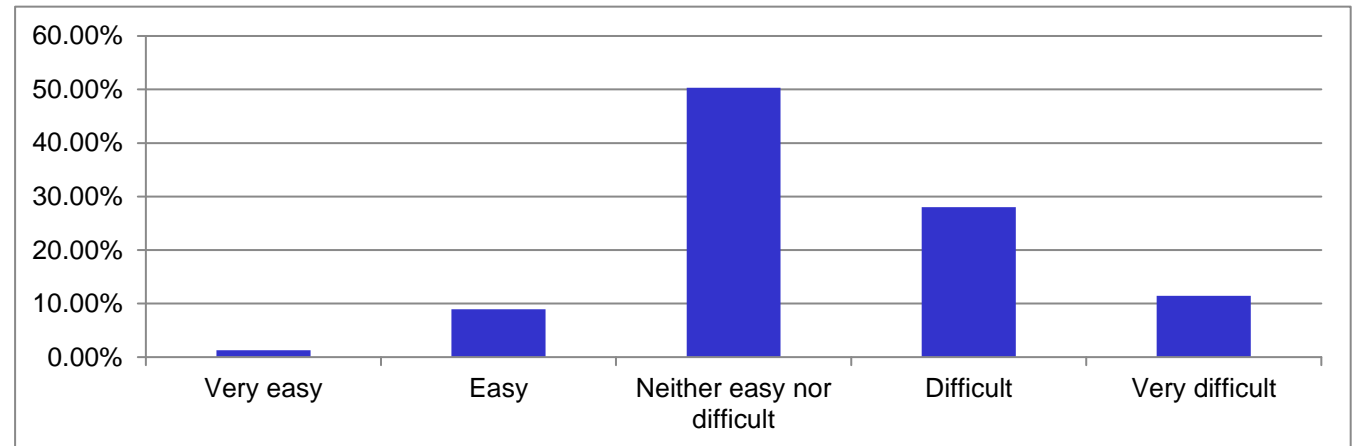

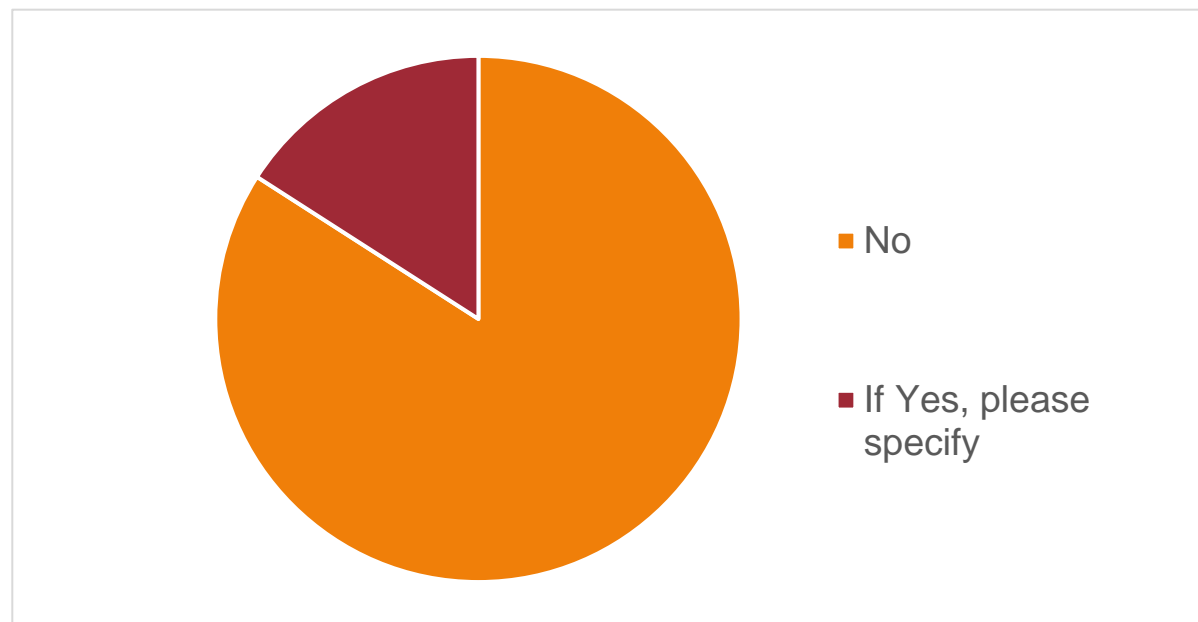
Q55. How easy do you think it is for people who are disabled or have limited mobility to get around in Inverleigh?

- I haven't been home for a couple of years because of travel restrictions so I'm unable to make an assessment on this.
- I think Inverleigh has a very good inclusion availability to its residents with the amount of clubs, events and committee's to become involved with.
- I would like to see everyone being able to get about, attend events and feel welcome in Inverleigh
- If I were in a wheelchair, I could not go to the canteen at the newly renovated sporting complex and make a purchase. The steps are quite high and there are NO ramps or disability access. I can't understand how the recent works were signed off and OK'd.
- improved traffic control at fuel area corner
- It would probably be better to come from someone with mobility difficulties
- Keep Vic Park alive. It is too much to be fully maintained by a community group. Get DEWLP to maintain it, as their role is to maintain Parks, or give it to Golden Plains to manage (with a caveat that GP can't subdivide ever). We pay huge rates here.
- Lack of footpaths and danger crossing the highway

- Vic Park has no access to the clubroom for wheel chairs and no disabled toilets/facilities.
- Wheelchair and walker aides have no ramps at the recently completed sporting complex renovations

- Yes, the term "senior citizen" is demeaning and pejorative. Many of us are still working and paying taxes well beyond retirement age. We are fit and active and support our community. Yet in Inverleigh, older people and their challenges of ageing are not given the same priority as youth or people living with a disability. It is sad that this is a growing community that is largely forgotten or hidden. Incorporating them back into the whole of the community is vital. The whole of the Community and its leadership properly supporting older people to live independently in Inverleigh is important and the demographics and Census shows this is increasingly important. The Council's position at the Structure Plan hearing was that older residents would simply have to move to find aged care accommodation. This is not the Inverleigh we know so we need to have leadership to lobby for the interests of people who have done so much for our community. Sometimes for generations!
